# Thoughts from Pastor John

# Hey, GA, what else?

A few weeks back, on Sunday October 13th, I preached a sermon I titled 'Hey, John, what else?' It fell as part of our fall theme-Created to Be. That day was dedicated to Created to be Generous. In that sermon I took some time to talk about the ways in which I observe Gustavus Adolphus living out the call to be generous with all which God has entrusted us.

Together we raised over \$2,500 for students that are attending secondary school in Tanzania, through our efforts of Bite's for Tanzania. It was through your generosity that we were able to resurface our north parking lot at a cost of over \$80,000. This parking lot allows us to continue to be a place of welcome, where all who show up can be safe.

What else? This is a church that is generous with a spirit of inclusion and welcome. Holding onto the promise that we are called to be a community that leads with the love of Christ and welcoming to anyone who shows up. To be honest, I could go on with my What Elses? This church gets it, it has and will continue to find ways to be generous people with all which God has entrusted us. This is what I ended the sermon with, when you asked Hey John, what else?...YOU TELL ME...and I mean it.

As great as it is to celebrate what we have done, we are the people of God and God continues to call us forward and asking *Hey*, *GA*, *what else*?

The reality of this congregation understanding its mission and call all came into clear view on Tuesday, October 22. As you may know Joe Norquist, a 95 year old life long member of Gustavus Adolpus, had died. We gathered together as a community to celebrate Joe's life and give God thanks for the gift of Joe in our presence. But here is what dawned on me... through out Joe's life GALC has done a lot of amazing things and has had lasting impacts on the community around us. Our church has changed drastically in 95 years. However, the one thing that has been true and that we have always of ourselves, is *Hey, GA, what else?* 

Throughout our history we have said goodbye to many, amazing people who have helped us answer the question of **Hey**, **GA**, **what else?** Through **you** we will be able to answer this question once again...as we live into who God is calling us to be.

I will be sending you additional information in November, sharing with you some lofty goals for our ministry in 2025. Although aggressive, I am confident we each can step up in new ways that will stretch us and allow us to achieve our goals.

We are, indeed, *Created to be Generous*. I am excited to see the ways in which God is going to use us and allow us continue to be a church which has much to celebrate.

Dear Siblings in Christ

Many of our Sunday School families are attending worship in Luther Hall and our prayground is often full. One of my favorite things to watch over there is all of the movement!

Now there are many of us who grew up being told to sit still and be quiet in church. There is a gift to learning how to be calm and sit still, but I have been pondering the importance of movement and dance for the healing of our bodies and souls.

During my year on internship, I did a project exploring how church communities can help people process the trauma of the pandemic. I was captured by the research that insisted that trauma and healing need to happen in and through our physical bodies, not just in our logical thinking brains. Dance and movement were often cited as a space for individuals to express feelings and experiences that words cannot capture. By engaging in physical expression, people are able to release pent-up emotions and trauma that otherwise gets trapped in our very bodies.

I believe the ways we practice worship together through singing, swaying our bodies, and clapping together in rhythm is a critical way that we experience a sense of connection and can be a profound means of healing for those of us who gather. The ancient practice of worship has been a source of experiencing the healing power of God throughout generations.

In Christian theology, the incarnation represents God entering into the human experience in the person of Jesus Christ. This act of becoming flesh signifies an intimate connection between the divine and the material world. Through the incarnation, God not only affirms the value of the physical body but also demonstrates a commitment to healing and restoration.

# **Thoughts from Pastor Ruthie**

After the Israelites escaped slavery and crossed the Red Sea, Miriam led them in song and dance. King David dances before God in the temple. Many of the Psalms portray singing and dancing. In his book My Grandmothers Hands focusing on how race, trauma, and body awareness intersect, Resmaa Menakem writes, The sound of clapping can become a balm for the soul, a reminder that we are alive, present, and part of something larger. Such experiences are spiritual, drawing us out of ourselves and connecting us to one another and God.

One of the biggest gifts I have received from being with our partners in Tanzania is the gift of realizing that there are millions of Lutherans that dance in worship. I can't explain it so much in words, but there is power in the act of moving together to the rhythm of music. This past Reformation Sunday it was such a joy to dance in the aisle waving streamers and scarves throughout the congregation.

As we come together in these ways, we enter a space where healing can occur—healing of the individual, the community, and ultimately, a healing that reflects the divine purpose of restoration for all creation. In this beautiful dance of faith, we can experience a deeper connection to the incarnational love of God that seeks to heal and redeem..

#### Christian Nationalism: what it is, why it matters and how we can respond.

American Christians have always struggled with the relationship between church and state. But recently the alignment between right-wing politics and Christianity has taken on a new intensity. This power grab co-opts the language and symbols of Christianity, deceiving many and harming both faith and democracy. (Christian nationalism strongly influenced the Jan. 6, 2021, riot in Washington, D.C.) How do we understand this movement and respond to it?

Over the past two years Pastor Rolf Olson has made over 30 presentations on this topic to metro congregations. On November 3 and 10 he will lead us in a discussion of what "Christian Nationalism" is and why it matters, who's involved, and ways we can respond.



#### Presenter's Bio:

Pastor Olson serves Roseville Lutheran church as visitation pastor after serving several congregations in Wisconsin and Minnesota. He is married and the father of two grown children and grandfather of five.

#### November 17 — 10:10 am in The Fireside Room Our Church's Namesake: King Gustav II Adolf of Sweden

Gustavus Adolphus is Latin for Gustav II Adolf, King of Sweden from 1611 - 1632, the "Lion of the North" and a military powerhouse during the Thirty Years War.

So why is our church named after him? The records are silent as to precisely how 'Gustavus Adolphus' was chosen, and what other names were considered, but we may agree that the new congregation chose well.

Learn more about how this unlikely figure sparks big important questions yet today, especially today – about faith, power, war and freedom. We'll discuss how those forces continue to affect us as people of faith -- and others.

Presenter's Bio: Monika Strom is a member of GA who recently traveled to Sweden and has done some research about who our church is named after. She is excited to share what she has learned with our congregation and lead a discussion with Pastor Ruthie Mhanga about what this might mean for us today.




LifeHaven is a family-style home on the east side of Saint Paul that provides housing and support to 16-17 year old mothers and their children, who are experiencing homelessness. Mothers attend regular parenting and life-skills classes, meet one-on-one with a case manager, and engage in fun and enriching activities. LifeHaven also accepts expecting mothers in their third trimester. The home houses six young families, who can receive support for up to 18 months, and offers on-site employees support 24 hours a day.
